



The Estate Records of Bishop Christian Yoder Sr of the Glades A Somerset County, PA Treasure Trove

The Registrar of Wills office in Somerset, Somerset County, Pennsylvania, contains a veritable treasure trove of original material. For researchers of the Amish Yoder lines which came through that southwestern Pennsylvania county, the records go into great detail of the sales which occurred in settlement of the estates involved. In addition to itemized inventories of what was to be sold, the files also include original sales rosters of who purchased what, and for how much, and notes signed by various parties involved in the settlements.

In this Article, we'll present details from the file of Bishop Christian Yoder Sr (1758-1838) (YR233). At the conclusion we'll give an inventory of the other Yoder holdings in the Registrar's files and information about how you can access these records.

Bishop Christian Yoder Sr was born in Berks County, PA in 1758 ("about October" according to one source). He was the son of immigrant "Schweitzer Christian" Yoder (1728-1816) and his first wife whose name is not known. On December 2, 1773 Schweitzer Christian was issued a warrant for 300 acres of land in what was to become Somerset County. He moved there with his children in 1775. In 1779 Christian, the son, married Magdalana Troyer. That year he is shown in township tax records as owning one horse and one cattle.

His appointment as Bishop of the Glades community in Northern Somerset County occurred between 1783 and 1788. In the words of his son, who was to become Bishop Christian Yoder Jr "He served in his Bishop ministry between 50 and 55 years and died in his eightieth year, on April 29, 1838."

Christian and Magdalana had fourteen children: Magdalana, 1780; Maria, 1781; Abraham, 1782; Joseph, 1784; Yost, 1786; John ("Jannes"), 1788; Christian, 1790; Solomon, 1793; Jacob, 1795; Sarah, 1797; David, 1799; Barbara, 1801; Jonathan, 1803; and Anna, 1808. Yost, Jacob, Sarah, David, and Barbara died young.

The first item in sequence in his Somerset County file is his will.

"Know all men by these present that I Christian Yoder of the Township of Stony Creek in the county of Somerset- Considering the uncertainty of mortal life and being yet of good sound mind and memory, Blessed be the Almighty God for the same, I do hereby make and **publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following**, that is to say, after my death my body is to be buried in a Christian like manner and the funeral expenses to be paid out of my personal estate- 1st first I give and bequeath to my wife Magdalana the tinplated stove now in the room, one clock, two beds and bedsteds, one corner cupboard, the two chests now in the house and as much household and kitchen furniture as she thinks necessary, and I further give and bequeath to my wife Magdalana all such books, now in my possession as she wants and that my wife Magdalana Yoder is to have and to hold the above mentioned articles during her natural lifetime and after her death my Executor is to make sale thereof as he may think proper and the money thereof to be equally divided among my children or their heirs. 2 It is my will that after my death my Executor to make sale of my personal estate as he may think best & to divide the money equally among my nine children or my heirs. 3 It is my will that the charges made now in my lifetime against my children shall be binding good and firm. 4th It is my will that my Executor shall take money from my acct not to be appraised Estate as much as is necessary to support my wife Magdalana with all such necessaries as she wants and to keep a

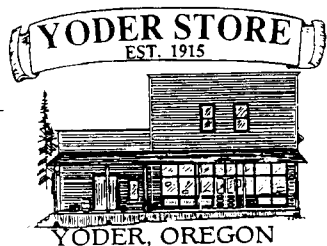

A YODER GEOGRAPHIC SUMMARY

We recently have purchased a 70 million name and address directory
on CD-ROM (Compact Disk/Read Only Memory). This has allowed us
to develop some interesting statistical data about the Yoder population
which may be of interest to our readers. These figures are based on folk
who have a telephone number so are likely to exclude our Amish family
members, and also we find that husband and wife are often listed
separately, and the areas of the country covered seem less than complete.

Oley YODER Cemetery book Published

We are pleased to announce the publication of Pleasantville Union Cemetery-A Photographic Review edited by Richard H Yoder of Bechtelsville, PA and published with the support of the Yoder Newsletter.

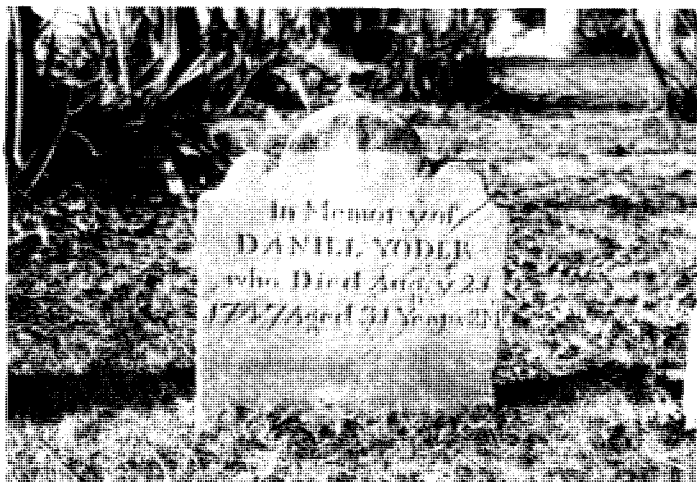
This cemetery marks the earliest known burial place for members of the Yoder family in America. The book includes a full identification of the stones in the cemetery and has dozens of excellent photographs of the individual stones of Yoder occupants. The earliest of these goes back to 1747 and is still legible. This 24 page booklet preserves these stones pictorially, regardless of the subsequent ravages of time and acid rain. It also provide family group information from the YNL files for the Oley families who have members and descendants resting here.



Gate and Drive to the Pleasantville Union Cemetery, Inc.

The Pleasantville Union Cemetery is located in Oley Township, Berks County, PA, approximately 1/8 mile south of the intersection of Covered Bridge Road and Route #73 at Pleasantville.

This was originally a Yoder family cemetery located on the original 461 acres Hans Yoder acquired on 25 March 1714. It remained a private family cemetery until 6 August 1886 when Lydia Yoder, widow of Isaac (OH1452) deeded it to the Pleasantville Cemetery Company with her son Henry S. Yoder being one of the trustees of the company.



In Memory of Daniel Yoder, died 1747 age 31

The deed agreement as taken from Berks Co. Deed Book (Vol 180 Page 456 6 Aug 1886) is excerpted as follows:

"Between Lydia Yoder of Oley Township, Berks Co., and state of Pennsylvania, widow, of the first part and Franklin R. Cleaver, Isaac Angstadt, James Harline and Henry S. Yoder, trustees of the

Pleasantville Cemetery Company of Oley Township, county and state aforesaid of the second part. witnesseth that the said party of the first part for and in consideration of the sum of eighty dollars (\$80.00) of lawful money of the United States of America.

"Beginning at a stone a corner thence N45 1/4 o E 105 ft to a corner, S 44 1/4 o E 270 ft, to a stake a corner S 45 1/4 o W 105 ft to a corner N 44 1/4/ W 270 ft, to place of beginning containing 92 1/2 perches."

The land of the immigrant brothers Hans and Yost adjoined each other. The cemetery lies approximately 450 yards from the Hans cabin and 650 yards from that of Yost.

At one time, there were two other smaller Yoder family cemeteries. One was on the Lloyd Zook farm (Yoder Newsletter #17) and the other on the Jacob Yoder/Maria Keim farm (Yoder Newsletter #16), neither cemetery exists any longer.

correct account of the same. 5th It is my will that my Executor after my death is to collect all my notes and demands to his best advantage and also my Executor is to pay all my debts and interest if any and to keep a correct account of same and to divide the over plus to my nine children above mentioned. 6th It is further my will that the agreement between John Burndrager and myself is to be binding without addition or subtraction thereto or from the same and to be carried into effect by my said Executor after my death. 7th It is my will that Christian Yoder Junr of Stony Creek Township, Somerset County shall carry my will into affect with as much correctness as possible whom I hereby appoint sole Executor of this my last will & Testament hereby revoking all former wills by me made- In witness whereby I have hereunto set my hand and seal the seventh day of February 1838.

"Signed Sealed and delivered by the above named Christian Yoder to be his last will and testament in the presence of us who at his request in his presence have hereunto subscribed our names as witnesses thereunto- John B. Miller, Abner Yoder, Johannes Burndrager."

The will was Registered on the 3rd of May 1838 with Jacob Kimmel. Registrar, by J.B. Miller and John Burndrager (husband of Christian's youngest daughter Anna).

The following documents relating to the settlement also appear in the file:

- Inventory & Appraisal of the Goods and Chattles of Christian Yoder Decd-- Filed May 29th 1838
- "Vendue List" on the Estate of Christian Yoder decd--Filed 29 Jun 1838 (Sale held 5 Jun at house of Christian Yoder)
- Various receipts for expenses
- "Vendue List" -2nd Estate Sale in 1843,at death of Magdalena -filed 12 Sep 1843 (sale held at house of John Borndrager on 2 Sep 1843)
- Executors Account- filed Feb 6, 1844
- Vouchers- filed 6 Feb 1844
- Administration Account- filed Feb 19, 1844
- Releases from other heirs- dates through 1846

Among the Receipts are several of interest:

- May 3, 1838- J B Miller received 92 cents and John Burndrager got 80 cents for proving the will.
- Jun 6, 1838- David Yoder and Christian Yoder were paid 25 cents for appraising the Personal Property.
- Jun 6, 1838- Benjamin Kimmel was paid \$3 for clerking at the first sale. On Sept 8, 1843 he earned \$1.25 for clerking at the second sale.
- Jun 20, 1838- Solomon Bare received \$2 for "Crying the Sale".
- Jun 23, 1838- Tobias Speicher recd \$3 for Christian's coffin.
- Jun 25, 1838- J B Miller was paid \$1.25 for "clarking the appraisement and writing advertisements".
- Jan 16, 1844- Tobias Speicher was paid \$3 from the estate for "Magdalane"'s coffin.
- Jan. 31, 1843- John Burndrager was paid \$100 for "mentaining the witoiw".

The sale lists provide a fascinating picture of the life of Christian and Magdalana, and the names of the purchasers provide a broad cross-section of the Amish and "English" community of the area at that time. Over 170 pieces were itemized at the first sale, and over 150 at the second. The proceeds from the first sale were \$213.55. The second was not totaled, but the figures are much smaller.

Yoder buyers at the sales included the children: David, Joseph, Christian, Jonathan; but also others in the area: Christian Yoder "Dick", Philip Yoder, Elizabeth, Bennedict Yoder, Abner Yoder. Sons

Solomon and Abraham had moved from the area by this time and were not present.

Bringing the most money at the first sale were: A Deerburn Wagon- sold to Joseph Yoder for \$25.10, a Mare and Colt- sold to John Houghstedler for \$40.76, a Cow- sold to Christian Yoder "Dick" for \$16.47, and a copper kettle- sold to George Steele for \$11.40 1/2 cents. Lesser items included a rat trap- 13 cents, a spinning wheel 12 1/2 cents, and a whiskey keg (sold to Christian Yoder "Dick") for 24 cents, a "slead" for 25 1/2 cents, pewter plates - \$1 & a craddle-11 cents (sold to son Jonathan)

Particular items of interest include a number of books sold at the first and second sales. This is in keeping with an educated man with the responsibilities of his religious office. John Borndrager Jr bought about half the books sold at the first sale. One Bible was sold for \$1.01 to John Houghstedler. The second sale, however, seems to also have included valuable family heirlooms. Books sold at the sale following Magdalana's death included:

- Testament to Christian Yoder for 12 1/2 cents
- "Psam book" to Abner Yoder for 60 cents
- Family Bible to Joseph Yoder for \$1.00
- Book of Myrters to John Borndrager for \$6.12 1/2cents

The "family bible" seems a particular treasure. Joseph also bought the clock, mentioned in Christian Sr's will. paying \$15.01 . We wonder if these treasures are still in the possession of his descendants today?

In YNL # 14 we had an article about an ancient Martyrs Mirror which included notes and a signature by a "Christian Yoder". We at the YNL feel that it is very possible that this copy is the same book sold to John Borndrager in 1843.

Releases filed at that time also show that Anna, wife of John Borndrager, had previously received a settlement of \$578.25, as did Maria, Abraham, and Solomon. The heirs of Magdalena had received \$85.64.

One final item in the file is a "Rule on the Heirs and legal Representatives of Christian Yoder decd" dated April 29, 1880 . This calls on the heirs to appear in Orphans Court on the first Monday of May to accept or refuse to take the real estate of said deceased at the appraised price. What happened at this hearing, will take some additional research to learn.

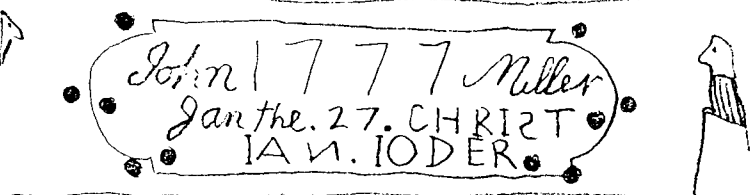
The review we've given is the record of one prominent Yoder in his community. But you can see the breadth of information to be mined from the files of Somerset County. We have mentioned in previous newsletter how a substantial percentage of our readers are descended from "Schweitzer Christian" Yoder. As Bishop Christian was his eldest son, it is natural to assume that some of the key family heirlooms, such as the "Family Bible" and Martyrs Mirror ("Book of Myrtyrs") are likely to have passed down through this line, and reflected in this estate.

SOMERSET COUNTY RECORDS- Linda Jo Berkey is the Register of Wills in Somerset County, PA. Her office is located in a building adjacent to the Courthouse in Somerset which is open from 8:30 to 4:00 Monday through Friday. They have all original papers for the estates files in that office. Wills are kept with the original papers in the estate. Copying charges are a \$5 minimum for a will, probate papers are by the page (50 cents per page).

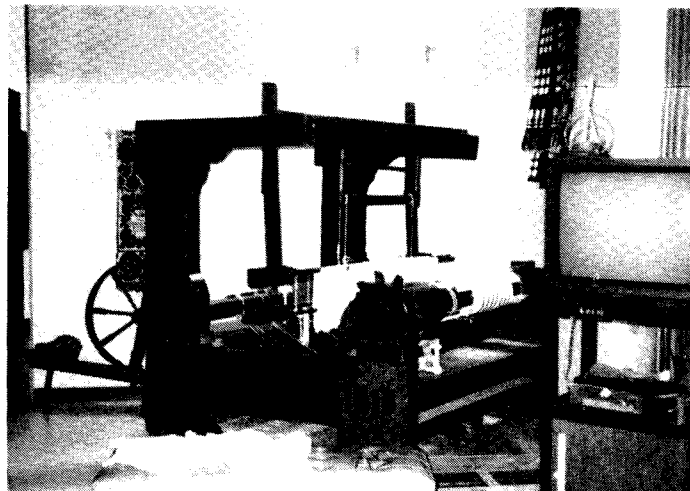

"Christian Ioder" Loom-Somerset County Historical Society
 Our feature article gives details of the Somerset County Clerk of Wills Office. If you find yourself in the area, it would be well worth your time to stop by the Somerset County Historical Center on RR2 (phone 814-445-6077).

Among their many items of local history is an old loom which was known to have been purchased at an auction in the middle of the 19th century. The head piece says "John Miller 1777 Jan the 27. CHRISTIAN IODER". This appears to be the same Christian Yoder (YR233) as shown in our feature article. He and his family had moved to Somerset in 1775. Two John Miller's (ML2 and ML22 per Gingerich/Kreider) were also in Somerset county around that time. Building a new loom would have been a natural project for the younger John (b c1752) and Christian Yoder (b 1758) to jointly undertake.

A review of the estate sales of Christian ad his wife Magdalena in 1838 and 1843 show no loom being sold. When their son Christian Jr died, his daughter Elizabeth (later married Samuel Beachy and moved to Indiana) is shown to have paid \$12.00 for a "loom and gears".. a price equivalent to what wagons and cattle brought. Transport to Indiana was not an easy thing in those days. Elizabeth's brother Reuben, is know to have gone by ox-cart, when he took this trip. An item as bulky as a loom couldn't have been spared the space and was doubtlessly left behind in Somerset County. Was this the same loom we see in this photograph?

WHEN DID CONRAD YODER GO TO NORTH CAROLINA?

The book *Counting Kindred* by Christian Deppin presents a history of Christian Ruchty and collateral family lines. On page 226 of this volume, it mentions that after Henry Weidner first went to North Carolina he returned to Pennsylvania and on "one return trip brought a wife Mary Mull and a youth Conrad Yoder- ancestors of a large and esteemed posterity."

Richard H Yoder of Bechtelsville checked with Helen Weidner in Reading (a historian of the Weidner family), who said that Henry Weidner was from the Epharts area in Berks County and had been disowned by his mother since he would not stay on the farm. He was rather "footloose". He married Mary Mull in 1748, and if the above statement is correct, that may have been the year Conrad Yoder joined the growing community of ex-Pennsylvanians in North Carolina.

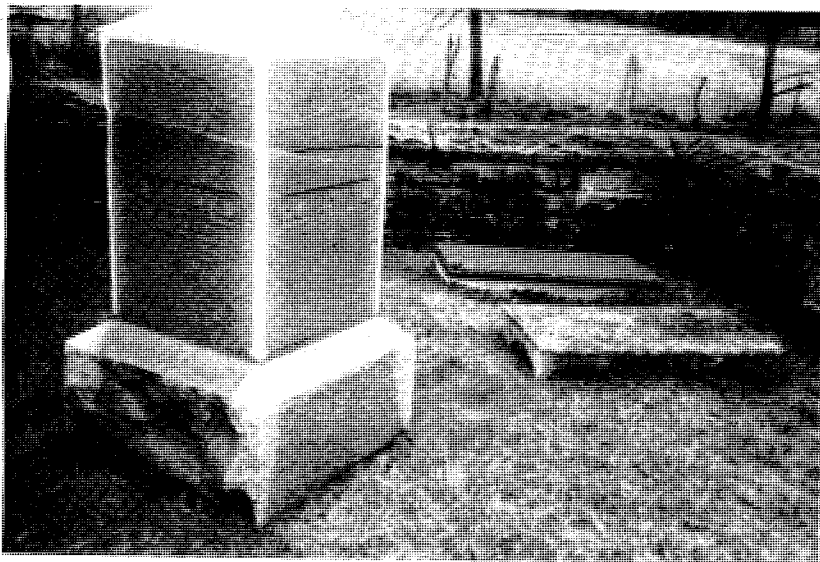
