### A BIT OF BISTORY

All American Yoders whose ancestry is known or suspected trace their lineage to the Joder clan in the canton of Bern in Switzerland. They are a very old family, anyarently of Germanic-Swiss stock, yet the name comes from St. Theodore (Theoforus, Theodulus) a missionary sonk who in the fourth century crossed the Alps from Italy to bring the Gospel to the Valais country in couthern Switzerland. This patron saint was held in ever greater reverence as time went on, and we hope in forthcoming Newsletters to give more on the story of his life and influence and of St. Joner items and places still existing today.

Joderhusbel (Yoder Hill) is a matural fortress on the Enne Hiver in the southern part of the canton of Bern. Since it was no ramed as far back as anyone can remember and Joders were said to have lived there in the middle ages, researcher Carl Joder of Ludwigshafen-am-Shein (West Germany) believen the family sust have lived there before records' history. The oldest record he has found is of a leter Jeder born in Joderhuetel in 1200. In 1389 a grandson Ulli Joder and his son Scini were among the Inaviest texpayers at outtail, a town about thirty miles porth. Karl Joner is confident that the Joders found later in nearby towns can be traced back to Will...including those of the town of Stefflaburg.

Steffishung, located near Thum south of Bern, is truly the homeplace of many Ameri-can Yoders and in discussing our European erigins we shall refer to Steffisturg again and again. Here Joders lived for generations as farmers, brewers, millers and other varying occumations. They were active in the uffairs of both church and state and a musher of heraldin hanners (coats-of-arms) are not in stained glass at the old Staffin-burg church, which was the center of a lurge parish. 

### THIRTY YEARS OF THE YODER NEWSLETTER

Many years ago, as I visited my grandparent's home in Elkhart, Indiana, I read my great-grandfather's copy of Descendants of Jacob Hostetler. It contained only a few paragraphs that talked about my Yoder ancestors. It also told the story of our common ancestor Jacob Hostetler, how he and sons were captured and held prisoner by Indians, and of his escape and return to civilization. One of the most memorable parts for a teenage boy told how the starving Jacob came upon a ripe dead opossum and ate it. From then on, my interest in family history was firmly fixed.

As a newlywed in the early 70's, my job took us to Harrisburg, PA, the state capital. We discovered the state library and the land records bureau. We were able to gather information about the early Yoders of our line. My wife and I were also able to drive over to Somerset County, PA where we did some exploring and research there with the help of several local residents. When the 1976 Bi-Centennial came around, I put my notes together and shared them with members of my immediate family.

After two children and an overseas assignment in Germany, we found ourselves settled in Battle Creek, Michigan. I had read of a Yoder historian named Rachel Kreider, who had written about the St. Joder Chapel, and who had studied the Yoder family. She and her husband Leonard, a retired chemical researcher with B. F. Goodrich, were in the process of moving from Bluffton, OH to Goshen, Indiana, not too long a drive from us. So I wrote her a letter introducing myself and telling her of my interest in things Yoder. She quickly wrote back explaining that two of her greatgrandmothers were sisters of my great-great grandfather Reuben Yoder. He had been the origin point for the Yoder family information collected by her uncle John Weaver. She knew of another Goshen Yoder, a retired teacher and school principal named Ben, with a similar interest in collecting and sharing the Yoder story. Soon after Rachel was settled into their home at the Greencroft retirement community, the three of us sat down at her kitchen table to talk thing: over.

stand on the shoulders of many great family historians. Bits of family lore, Bible records, and public documents had come together over the years to paint the pictures of the different Yoder branches. Our readers helped us identify, gather, and begin to share this information. Over the past 30 years, many people have been a part of this work. "Lost records" (that were really there all the time, had we known where to look), have revealed themselves. In the past 59 issues of the Yoder Newsletter, we've been able to share our discoveries and analyses of them. Now seems to be an appropriate time to try to :ummarize the "facts" which have evolved and give a baseline of what we know (or think we know) today.

In our first issue, we outlined the various branches on the American Yoder tree. Only one of them, the Oley Yoders, was clearly linked to its European origins. Other lines, like those of the Mennonite, Amish, and North Carolina Yoder families, stopped at

The Olev Valley Voders, Hans and Yost, (our codes "OH" and "OY") are still recognized as America's "first family" of Yoders, leaving Germany in 1709. Early historical works by Dr. Peter Bertolet, a Yoder descendant, give a sketch of the Yoder family, as did the 1886 History of Berks County by Morton L. Montgomery. In YNL5, we were pleased to present an article by Dr. Don Yoder in which he described how one of his contacts in Germany, Karla Mittelstaedt-Kubateck, had, sometime after 1974, come upon and provided him with a record from the Schwetzingen Reformed Church that tells of Johannes (Hans) Joder and family departing "to the island of Pennsylvania." This was to be the first confirmed link between the American Yoders and the Joder family of Steffisburg, Switzerland. VNL contributing editor Dick Yoder of Bechtelsville, PA has researched these Yoders extensively and has contributed much information to the YNL since our early days.




German researchers Karl Joder (died 1984) and Otmar Jotter traced back their own lines to the town of Steffinburg, Switzerland. They dug through and copied the local church records and also have done extensive research in several German locations. Over time, they compiled their information into books which were photocopied and shared in different versions with their American coutins. 


Steffisburg today- by John W Bieber

(1) Great grandfather of Michael Yoder, 1825 immigrant to Somerset county, Pawhose father Samuelwore in 1806 from Germany to his "Dear Cousins" (YR23 and YR25);(2) parents of Hans and Yost Yoder, Reformed Church settlers to the Oley Valley of Berks Co., PA- first Yoders in America; (3) Labeled as Ababaptistin 1691; (4) suspected as Baptistin 1690; (5) identified in 1690 court records as suspected Anabaptists, could also have been the Jacob Joder who m. 

## **Updating the NC Yoder Book**

**Origins of Yoders in Europe** 

(The author is indebted to Doctor Don Yoder, of Devon Pennsyl- vania, foremost historian of Yoders in Europe and the United States, for many of the historical facts of the first section of this chapter. taken from his pamphlet, "Origins of the Pennsylvania Yoders.")

Yoders in the United States are of Swiss origin. The name Yoder (Joder, in Swiss German) is derived from Saint Theodore, one of the Christian Missionaries, who brought the Christian message into the Swiss Alms in the Middle Ages. The name Saint Theodore was abbreviated to Saint Joder. Swiss churches often portraved Saint Joder, JOHN SON OF CONRAD

was abbreviated to Saint Joder. Swiss churches often portrayed Saint Joder evil. In the Swiss Reformed Church Almanac, August 16 is still listed as Sa mountain peak called Saint Joderhorn in honor of Saint Joder.

Joders (Yoders) are first mentioned as residing in or near the two Swi in the highland area of Canton Bern, and the latter in Canton Aargau. Jode 1400's. Joders still live in these two villages.
